

To help students get back to school safely this fall, the City installed 35 signal cabinet wraps as part of a bicycle and pedestrian safety campaign funded by a California Office of Traffic Safety grant through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. Antelope Valley and Lancaster High School students helped develop the City's "See And Be Seen" campaign, which includes four focal messages: *Make Eye Contact; Eyes Up, Phone Down; Ride Right in the Bike Lane; and Walk Between the Lines.*

Innovative & Sustainable Growth

The City's leadership philosophy has evolved into an action plan to push our community forward. We are strategically overcoming challenges that pose a threat to the existing and future livability of our City. Our Fiscal Year (FY) 2019-20 Adopted Budget is structured to prioritize the efforts that support our long-term success while emphasizing the very principles which guide our vision. These guiding principles include putting people first; enhancing the quality of life; and incorporating technology, innovation, and resilience to propel Lancaster into a thriving future. By providing highly effective public services for the common good, the City will fulfill these tenets.

As an organization, the City is stepping outside of its comfort zone and taking a fresh new look at operations. With technology, innovation, and economic resilience as key integrations into our operational model, top initiatives this year include creating new revenue streams; effectively addressing homelessness; incorporating hybrid policing models; improving access to healthcare; advancing


educational opportunities; heightening professional workforce appeal; expanding energy programs; updating roadways; and modernizing citywide infrastructure. Fueling job creation and generating tax revenue with flourishing economic development also remains paramount. Numerous organizational projects are in motion to ensure each of these objectives and more are met with mechanisms in place to continue advancements as needed.

The most impressive aspect of achieving these substantial goals over the next year will be doing so while maintaining 30% General Fund reserves.

The City of Lancaster embraces progress and all the challenges that come with leading by example. CITY TAKES ON STIR-Based Projects for Year Ahead

Lancaster has reached a pivotal moment in its evolution as a city.

We face a unique set of circumstances during the dawning of a technological revolution, which presents an opportunity for us to positively affect the way people live their daily lives. Enter **Strategic Technology, Innovation & Resilience**, or STIR. The three pillars of the STIR initiative drive the City's "reach goals," which comprise the FY 2019-20 budget projects. By pillar, these projects include, but are not limited to:



STRATEGIC TECHNOLOGY

- Expanding and enhancing the City's fiber network, which serves as a conduit for connecting residents, businesses, and the City to the Internet, thus enhancing connectivity.
- Installing smart nodes on streetlights to provide public safety technologies, infrastructure monitoring, and economic development tools, thus maximizing the functionality of City assets.
- Incorporating state-of-the-art software to streamline processes and save significant staff time, allowing for greater focus on citizen concerns.



INNOVATION

- Constructing and updating key City assets, including park improvements; community beautification; a skate park installation; as well as City Hall and Maintenance Yard renovations.
- Improving local streets by leveraging \$60 million in grant funding from LA Metro to modernize freeway interchanges, as well as up to \$57 million in road bond funds to accelerate Revive 25.
- Building a community center to provide dedicated space for community activities and organizations, as well as a Makerspace area for collaborative learning.



RESILIENCE

- Implementing the Hybrid Law Enforcement Model to maximize the effectiveness of City and Sheriff's Department services throughout Lancaster to increase community safety in a strategic and coordinated manner.
- Developing the Parkway Village specific plan, which encompasses a mixed-use district with retail, dining, and a wide range of housing options to meet the growing needs of local firms.
- Implementing the P3 Initiative to enable public-private partnerships that facilitate development and economic growth, while creating new revenue streams for the City.

With healthy reserves, a balanced budget, and a thriving economy, the City is ideally positioned to implement this aspirational vision for the future of Lancaster. Together, we will continue to build a city known for its economic and environmental sustainability, commitment to design excellence, and relentless innovation.

Meet Commissioner NIGEL HOLLY

City of Lancaster Homeless Impact Commissioner Nigel Holly is a 19-year resident of the Antelope Valley. A champion for equality and justice, he applies his expertise to his role on the Commission, embracing the vision to positively impact the quality of life for all members of the community through an integrated and intentional approach to addressing homelessness. Mr. Holly works alongside his fellow commissioners to promote and support a thriving community via responsive, purposeful, and adaptable solutions for housed and unhoused community members.

In addition to his commission duties, Mr. Holly also serves as the Director of Pathways for Success, a member of the Antelope Valley Educational Alliance (AVEA); the North County Director of Parents, Educators, and Students in Action (PESA); and the Coordinator of the Antelope Valley High School Teen Court. These roles help him facilitate his commitment to continuously challenge at-risk youth to recreate themselves for sustained change and growth, thus promoting a paradigm shift.

Mr. Holly's dedication to the advancement of youth in community engagement is also realized through his position as one of the coordinators for the City of Lancaster's annual Justice Sunday event. Each year, he selects youth from all over the Valley to help

organize the local production with the National Alliance of Faith and Justice. Justice Sunday activities educate the community regarding the history and contributions of African Americans in the United States. Youth participants learn to research, analyze, and disseminate information in a relatable way that the community can comprehend. The experience culminates with the information being transformed into a play that is outlined by Mr. Holly and performed by the youth. This performance has received accolades from all over the country.

Desiring the best for the Antelope Valley, Nigel Holly believes clear goals are attainable goals and often states, "We may not change the world today, but we can change this community... our community."

In addition to being a mentor and advocate for youth, Nigel Holly is a dedicated father who enjoys hiking, camping, and archery in his downtime.

Learn to **STRUT & CYCLE** Safely

Street design, traffic speed, and road/sidewalk quality are all factors that influence health, physical activity levels, and the number of pedestrian and bicycle collisions that occur in our communities. Research also shows that deciding where and when to walk or bike on local streets and public areas shapes how risky or safe we perceive these areas to be.

To improve access, as well as gain and provide perspective, the City of Lancaster will engage residents through a Community Pedestrian and Bicycle Safety Training (CPBST) on Thursday, September 26, 2019, from 4-7 p.m. at the American Heroes Park Community Building.



The CPBST program, which is a joint project of UC Berkeley SafeTREC and California Walks, includes training and skill building in pedestrian and bicycle safety. The program also creates opportunities for collaboration among communities, local officials, and residents. The goal is to make Lancaster safer and more pleasant for walking and biking.

The City has identified that 60% of all pedestrian and bicycle injury collisions between 2013 and 2017 happened within a three-mile radius of Monte Vista Elementary. As such, the CPBST will be focused on the community surrounding the school.

BUILDING A SAFER COMMUNITY

One Path at a Time



The City of Lancaster is planning a wide variety of roadway infrastructure improvement programs over the next several years. These efforts will range from conducting a comprehensive preventative maintenance program—that will require every public street in Lancaster to be resurfaced—to designing and implementing projects based on “complete streets” concepts that will include the construction of a network of connected trails and bikeways. These improvements will be primarily located along major corridors throughout Lancaster and are geared towards increasing the mobility options and level of safety for residents.

Launched in 2016 as an innovative, cost effective road maintenance program, the Revive 25 initiative is a plan to maximize the life of all City roads by investing more in preventative maintenance to avoid pavement issues before they occur. This preventative approach utilizes new technology and strategies to maximize the durability of treated roads. This enables Lancaster to postpone or completely avoid major reconstruction and lengthy road closures while saving taxpayers more than \$280 million over 10 years, as the City works to treat every Lancaster road by 2025.

A second effort that dovetails into the Revive 25 initiative is the implementation of the City’s Master Plan of Complete Streets. “Complete Streets” refers to streets, sidewalks, and public rights-of-way that are designed, operated, and maintained to enable safe access for all users. The implementation of Complete Streets is intended to increase access and convenience for all users to adjacent land-uses, while still providing functional, multimodal street performance for all modes of travel through the area.




The Master Plan of Complete Streets was adopted in 2017 and identifies existing and potential Complete Streets in Lancaster. It also guides future expansion of Complete Streets through flexible development standards and design guidelines.



In 2012, the City of Lancaster adopted its Master Plan for Trails and Bikeways with the overall intent of guiding the planning and design of pedestrian, bicycle, and equestrian facilities throughout Lancaster. The goal is to create a connected network of on-road and off-road trails and bikeway facilities to accommodate users of all ages and abilities. This Plan was developed with citizen input to encourage people to use healthier modes of transportation in Lancaster. Once completed, the resulting network will provide connections between residential areas and activity centers across the City.

Sgt. Steve Owen Memorial Park Monument Coming Soon

Sergeant Steve Owen loved this community and protected its residents with every fiber of his being until his life was taken on October 5, 2016, while in the line of duty. A man full of vigor and committed to service, both professionally and personally, Sgt. Owen was a genuine local hero beloved by many. In celebration of his tremendous impact on the Antelope Valley community, the Lancaster City Council renamed the City's flagship park in his honor and commissioned the construction of a memorial that would tell his story to future generations.

In partnership with students at Learn4Life Concept Charter Schools, Lancaster's Parks, Recreation and Arts Department began the design phase of a memorial park monument in 2017. In spring 2018, the concept was completed and approved by Sgt. Owen's family and the Lancaster City Council.

Upon completion, Sgt. Owen's memorial will include steel panels representing various aspects of his life and influence on the community; a riderless horse statue with backward-facing boots (known as a caparisoned horse) standing on a raised platform in the shape of the Sheriff's star; planters with low-water-use landscape encircling the monument; and accent paving around the perimeter.



Slated for unveiling before year's end, the Sgt. Steve Owen Memorial Park Monument is a highly anticipated symbol of community appreciation and pride for having such a man of immense character and duty so deeply ingrained in the fiber of the Antelope Valley.

Investors Find Promising Prospects in Lancaster's Designated **OPPORTUNITY ZONES**

Six tracts within the City have qualified for new private investment incentives

In 2017, Congress passed a sweeping tax bill which cut taxes for many individuals and businesses. The bill also included provisions that offer new incentives to investors who choose to help finance projects in designated Opportunity Zones.

Six census tracts in Lancaster qualify as Opportunity Zones, meaning residential and commercial projects developed within these areas may offer unique advantages to those who help fund these improvements.

“Opportunity Zones target areas in need of new investment to see their full potential bloom,” notes Assistant to the City Manager Chenin Dow, who oversees Lancaster’s economic development. “By aiming innovative incentives at key infill areas, we believe we can attract millions of dollars into the community to revitalize these areas, encourage higher density and smarter development, create added jobs, and spawn economic vitality for everyone.”

Areas of the City which may qualify for favored tax treatment for positive economic development include Downtown Lancaster; the adjacent Transit-Oriented District; the Sierra District, between Avenue I and Avenue K; east of Sierra Highway to Challenger Way; as well as the new Medical Main Street project area surrounding Antelope Valley Hospital.

Also targeted for new improvements is Parkway Village—a zone stretching from Avenue K down to the City’s southern border at Avenue M, between 10th Street West and Sierra Highway. This area is envisioned as a high-density, mixed-use component in the “urban fabric” of the community. Specific planning for the area is currently underway.

Qualified investments on projects within these zones may be able to defer, reduce, or eliminate payment of capital gains taxes earned from business improvement and construction activity made via an Opportunity Fund serving a zone.

There are clear advantages to both businesses and residents within and around these zones. New investment in the community can mean additional jobs and greater economic prosperity for all who live and work within the City. It also improves quality of life by bringing new housing, services, and products to previously underserved urban areas.

MULTI-FUNCTIONAL MONOLITHS

Add to Lancaster's Growing SMART CITY Infrastructure

Residents will benefit from better cellular and Wi-Fi coverage in public places



The towers feature a sleek multifunctional design which will amplify cellular coverage and connectivity throughout the City.

The City of Lancaster is implementing a new pilot program for enhanced communications in collaboration with Landmark Infrastructure Partners, a leading colocation company.

"Through this innovative public/private sector partnership, we will provide our residents with more advanced communications capabilities on a faster timeline than would be possible under a traditional rollout," noted Lancaster City Manager Jason Caudle. "Lancaster has become known as a 'City of Firsts.' We are pleased to launch this program with Landmark as we set the stage for new smart-city advancements which will benefit all."

The towers will support both 4G and 5G cellular technology as well as Internet of Things (IoT) applications. They'll be equipped with battery backup capabilities to ensure continued coverage during emergencies and include LED lighting, which will provide added security at City parks and facilities.



Under the agreement, which will generate several thousand dollars per month in revenue to the City, Landmark will construct 15 new towers in key locations. Each will support up to four antenna arrays from all major cellular providers, as well as sensors and Wi-Fi antennas for test purposes. Added security features include a 360-degree camera. Each tower is sheathed in an attractive casing which can be enhanced with identity graphics for wayfinding.

The fifteen initial towers will be placed at City Hall, the Lancaster Sheriff's Station, the City's Maintenance Yard, the Metrolink Station, JetHawks Stadium, two park and ride facilities, plus seven parks around town. If the pilot project proves viable, additional installations may be added. Installation of the first tower at Rawley Duntley Park is expected to be completed by the end of the year.




Goodies Galore on The BLVD

SMART APPROACHES TO NEIGHBORHOOD SAFETY

According to the FBI, a burglary occurs every 22 seconds in the United States. The City of Lancaster is implementing thoughtful strategies to safeguard neighborhoods against these serious crimes. For instance, adopting a hybrid law enforcement model, along with supporting Neighborhood Watch teams, adds resources to create a more active, well-monitored community. Efforts are aimed at understanding when, where, and how break-ins happen in order to be more proactive instead of reactive.

The City also pursues innovative partnerships that benefit residents directly. Last October, the City collaborated with home security company, Ring, on a rebate program for purchases of smart doorbell and spotlight devices for up to 1,000 residents. Ring's devices are equipped with high-definition cameras and motion-detection technology, which instantly notify customers of activity around the home via a mobile app. Through the Ring neighbor app, residents can work collaboratively to fight crime in their neighborhoods, keeping each other alert and aware of anything taking place in their neighborhood.



In bringing more smart technology to Lancaster neighborhoods, the rebate program successfully promoted another layer of protection against home intruders. More than 8,300 devices from the Ring brand alone are currently activated in the City.

With these endeavors in place, burglaries in Lancaster are declining. Compared to last year, there have been 28% less residential burglaries in the first six months of 2019. Encouragingly, home burglaries occurring during the daytime are down nearly 40%—confirming smart approaches prove beneficial.

CODE ENFORCEMENT CORNER

Autumn ushers in colorful treetops and robust breezes—a combination that, though refreshing to the senses, wreaks havoc on street gutters. Fallen leaves quickly fill up yards and, if not dealt with properly, can clog up neighborhood drainage areas that are crucial to our community's infrastructure. Daily lawn watering and occasional rain can result in significant flooding throughout the City when leaves and other debris block gutters. Two surefire ways to prevent drainage issues are to promptly bag fallen leaves on personal property and ensure all vehicles are moved off of the street during designated street sweeping days and hours in your area. The City's street sweeper is your friend, getting in the down and dirty places so you don't have to and making sure the drainage system on your block continues to flow smoothly. Let's all practice safe fall maintenance habits this season by keeping residence and business gutters leaf and debris free!

- Carry a flashlight and fasten reflective tape to your costumes for improved visibility
- Avoid trick-or-treating alone; walk in groups or with a trusted adult
- Look both ways before crossing the street and use crosswalks whenever possible
- Only eat factory-wrapped treats

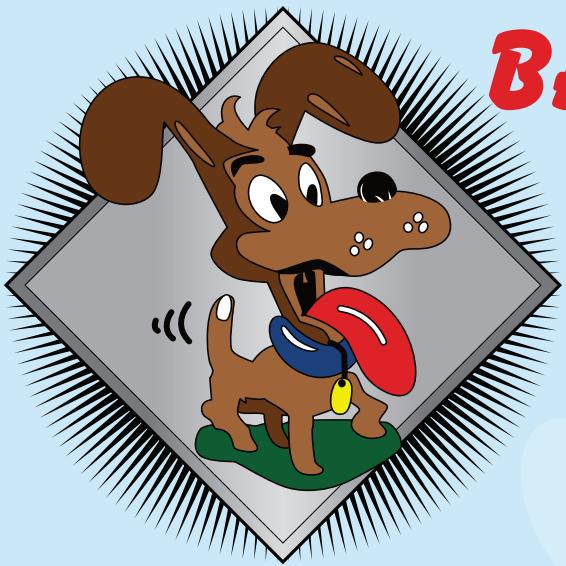



CLASS INFORMATION

All classes: 8 lessons, 30-minutes long; except Level 6, Aquacise, and Hydrofit, which are 45 minutes.

Parent/Tot

(6 mos.-3 yrs.) Parents teach their children to feel more relaxed and comfortable in the water.

Preschool

(3-5 yrs.) Children learn to feel comfortable in water, as well as how to control breathing, flutter kick, front float, and back float. This is not a learn-to-swim class.

Preschool 2

(3-5 yrs.) **Prerequisite:** Three sessions of Preschool swim class. Preschoolers advance to prone kick glide and underwater movement, as well as combination arm and kick movements.

Preschool 3

(3-5 yrs.) **Prerequisite:** Three sessions of Preschool 2 swim class. Preschoolers advance to side breathing, as well as enhance combined arm and kick movements.

Level 1: Introduction to Water Skills

(6-14 yrs.) Helps students feel comfortable in water. Learn to enter and exit water safely; submerge mouth, nose, and eyes; exhale underwater through mouth and nose; open eyes underwater; pick up submerged object; as well as float on front and back.

Level 2: Fundamental Aquatic Skills

(6-14 yrs.) Teaches fundamental skills and enhances Level 1 skills. Learn to enter water by stepping or jumping from side; exit water safely using ladder or side; submerge entire head; perform front and back glide; roll over from front to back, back to front; swim on side; swim on front and back; and tread water.

Level 3: Stroke Development

(6-14 yrs.) Builds on skills in Level 2 through additional guided practice. Learn to jump into deep water from side; dive from kneeling or standing position; submerge and retrieve an object; bob with head fully submerged; use rotary breathing in horizontal position; perform Check-Call-Care in an emergency; and change from horizontal to vertical position on front and back. Additional skills taught include front and back glide, survival float, front and back crawl, butterfly kick and body motion, HELP and Huddle position, as well as reaching assist.

Level 4: Stroke Improvement

(6-14 yrs.) Develops confidence in skills learned and improves Level 3 skills. Learn to shallow dive and dive from stride position; swim underwater; feet-first surface dive; tread water using sculling arm motions and kicks; swim on side; and perform open turns on front and back using any stroke. Additional skills taught include front and back crawl, breaststroke, butterfly, and elementary backstroke.

Level 5: Stroke Refinement

(6-14 yrs.) Provides further coordination and refinement of Level 4 strokes, in addition to teaching survival swimming. Learn to tread water with two different kicks; perform rescue breathing; standing dive; shallow dive; glide two body lengths; and begin any front stroke.

Level 6: Swimming & Skill Proficiency

(6-14 yrs.) Refines the student's strokes to improve swimming ease, efficiency, power, and smoothness over greater distances. Class is designed with "menu" options that focus on preparing students to participate in more advanced courses.

Adult Swim Lessons

(15 yrs.+) Everyone can learn to swim. All skills taught.



LIFEGUARD TRAINING CLASS

(15 yrs.+) Enrollees must be able to:

1. Swim 300 yards nonstop with rhythmic breathing, utilizing front crawl or breaststroke.
2. Tread water for two minutes, using legs only, with hands in armpits.
3. Within one minute and 40 seconds: swim 20 yards without goggles, with face in or out of water; surface dive face first or feet first into deep water to retrieve 10 lb. brick; return to surface; and swim 20 yards on back, returning to the starting point with both hands holding the brick. During return, face must remain at or near the surface. Candidates are not permitted to swim the distance underwater. Candidates must exit the pool without the use of steps or ladders.

Candidates must bring their own CPR mask.
